PROJECT OVERVIEW

The City is reconstructing Reseda Blvd to improve safety and accessibility for all, as part of the BOE Complete Streets Program. This program provides an integrated approach for the reconstruction of streets and implementation of pavement rehabilitation and roadway safety measures by the Departments of Public Works and Transportation. This multi-agency project is one of the first of its kind, and will transform Reseda by investing \$19.5 million into your community. The project will improve the speed and efficiency of buses along the corridor, and make the street more beautiful, green, and comfortable for residents and businesses. Most of all, this project will save lives. Between 2009 and 2019, 110 people were killed or severely injured on this section of Reseda Blvd. Critical improvements to sidewalks, crosswalks, lighting, and traffic signals, and a dedicated space to ride a bicycle will make it a safer, more vibrant, and more accessible street for everyone. To complete this project, the City will need to remove 241 out of 707 on-street parking spaces along the corridor, though much of this parking is underutilized and several off-street City-owned public parking lots are available. The project will maintain the existing number of travel lanes.

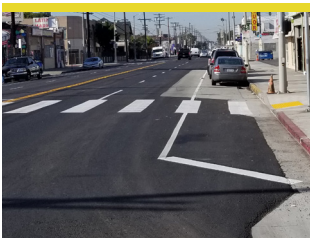

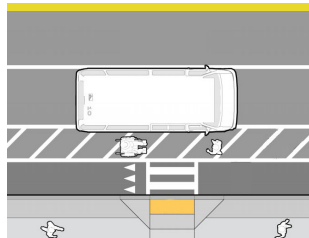

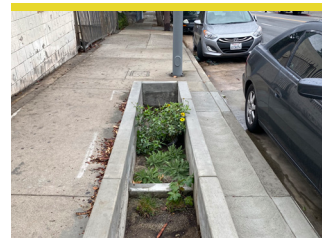
